

LACCD

- 9 colleges
 - Largest community college district in the country
- 200,000+ students
 - Half report incomes near or below the poverty line
- Survey results:
 - 64% experienced a basic needs insecurity
 - 40% are experiencing food insecurity
 - 55% are experiencing some form of housing insecurity
 - 13% have experienced homelessness in the past year

Key Themes

Feasibility

Intersegmental cohousing is both practical and urgently needed to address housing gaps.

Complexity

Collaboration across institutions is complex and requires thoughtful planning and coordination.

Intentionality

When designed with clear purpose, cohousing can significantly enhance student success, sense of belonging, and transfer outcomes.

Mutuality

Effective collaboration creates benefits for students and both partner institutions.



Enabling Conditions

Funding Availability

State funding for affordable student housing development and Cal Grant Student Success Completion Grant contribute public dollars.

Basic Needs Awareness

The COVID-19 pandemic and related research & advocacy increased awareness of basic needs insecurity and impact on student success.

Transfer Focus

Universities are increasingly prioritizing transfer students by establishing Transfer Centers and proactively engaging with CCs.

Pathway Efforts

Various statewide strategies remove systemic barriers and strengthen the pipeline from CC to university.



Riverside Community College District + UC Riverside Residential Scholars Program

Program

Opened August 2025, RCCD-UCR Residential Scholars program offers RCCD students a unique residential experience at the University of California, Riverside (UCR).

Through this innovative partnership, students live in UCR's North District 2 Residential Hall while pursuing their studies at RCCD.

Student Cost

\$750/month for shared room, \$850/month for single 30% of median-income for Riverside County









Los Angeles Community College District

Program

Several university partnerships under exploration, in addition to multiple models to build and/or acquire student housing

Considerations

Cost, transportation, access to food and other essential oncampus services







CSU San Bernardino + San Bernardino Valley College Den 2Den Housing Pathway Program

Program

The **Den2Den Housing Pathway Program** allows eligible SBVC students to live in CSUSB residence halls, enjoy full access to campus dining, and be part of a vibrant college community, all while attending classes at SBVC.

Student Cost

\$1,094.54 per student (total mandatory fees) includes students access to the Library, Recwell, and ID, etc.

Eligiblity

Students must apply and be reviewed by SBVC before being eligible to live on campus at CSUSB









CSU Dominguez Hills + Marymount California University *Prior* Housing Partnership

Program

Fall 2019 CSUDH had a housing waitlist of over 400 first year students.

Partnered with MCU to house about 280 students in their vacant housing facilities. Shuttle transported students to and from MCU throughout the week.

Student Cost

Students paid fees for housing as well as an activities fee to be involved in all co-curricular experiences.
